












Special Highlights





Thank you, judges.



Can you tell us about the winning photograph and what inspired it?

My self portrait "Sheltered" is one of, if not my favorite image I've created so I'm incredibly honored that it won first place in the Environmental Portraiture category. Although this image is a self portrait, it really revolves around my daughter and my desire to protect her.

We had been having a very intense spring full of thunderstorms and tornadoes. That's pretty common for spring time in Oklahoma, but this year it was particularly brutal. My daughter is very afraid of this weather so we had been spending just about every night with her curled up in our bed. Each night I would fall asleep with her crying in my arms because she was so scared. One morning, we woke up to some very loud thunder and lightning and again, I held her in my arms comforting and consoling her. It sounds dark but in that moment, I was thankful for her fear. Because without fear, there is no comfort. Metaphorically, I am the glass dome. The one that will shelter her, protect her, and ultimately guide her.

Were there any challenges you faced while creating the winning piece? How did you overcome them?

The biggest challenge I faced while creating this was not knowing if I was going to be able to pull it off. I've never edited myself to appear inside glass before so I was careful to make sure it looked as realistic as possible but with a surreal edge. Rather than just going out and hoping for the best, I sat down beforehand and really planned out as many of the details and technicalities before driving out to the location. Everything from my color palette, to props, to practical details were very intentional. To start, I shot the landscape with myself in the middle of the frame utilizing my 50mm lens to make sure I had my scale correct. I knew I was going to edit the glass dome over me so I then utilized my 135mm lens for that and shot at a much narrower aperture to get as much of the dome in focus as possible. I always try and get as many of my practical details as possible in camera so I sprayed the glass dome with water to make it appear as though it was actually raining outside. Everything else was Photoshop and careful color grading to make sure my intended tone came across very clearly.

What do you think set your photograph apart from the others?

My image of a blue car travelling through the heart of Havana feels somewhat iconic to me. I feel like it represents a time gone by in a place not fully understood by travelers from other countries. The strong motion blur tells a story well and makes me feel like I'm right there in the action, and the composition of the car just about perfectly in front of the Capitolio Nacional de Cuba lends a strong sense of urgency and importance. This photo makes the viewer really feel the moment!

How does it feel to be recognized in this competition?


I am a big advocate for printed photographic work, so having my images stand out in a print competition specifically is the icing on the cake! I also feel like having printed images stand out is tougher than on screen, so I'm proud my images have caught the eye. I'm not 'old-school', but I do feel that images found only online get lost all too easily. I love that I have my printed images to hang in my home as a tangible memory of my recognized work!

How does it feel to be recognized in this competition?

I was absolutely blown away that I placed 3rd in the Blue category. I have made it to Honorable Mention before over the years, but to see that winners ribbon on the corner of my work, it lit a fire in me to want to create more!

What role did print quality and presentation play in your submission? Do you believe it impacted the judges' decision?

I absolutely love the print quality and matting presentation of Musea Lab. I have used them the past four years, while having images make it to the Top 100. The color match is incredible and the customer service is amazing. I really like how they take the time with you and offer advice on cropping etc. Love how the gallery has a unified look for the judges.

Looking back, what advice would you give to photographers who aspire to win competitions like this?

Entering contests is sometimes hard as that imposter syndrome may set in and you may feel like your pictures don't measure up to other photographers. It's important to believe in yourself & step out of your comfort zone to try these new things. You may not win, but you might and you won't know until you try. I was very close to not entering in my images questioning if they were "good enough" as landscape is not typically something I take a lot of pictures of. I was very happy I did after my landscape images won both 1st and 2nd place. It was a very validating moment for me.

How do you view the role of print photography in a world that's increasingly digital?

I feel that it is important to have some prints in your house of your family. There is just so much going on in the world & in people's lives today that not every day may be a great day. However, it's in those moments you have this beautiful picture of your family, your kids, or pets, landscape, flowers, whatever it may be & it can bring you back to a better day when you take a minute to look at that print on your wall, mantel, or desk as you move on with your day.

they play a role in this winning piece?

My biggest influence as a photographer is undoubtedly my family. Every journey I take with them shapes how I see the world through my lens. This image, taken while sailing through the Alaskan Fjords, is a perfect reflection of that. It's not just about capturing a scene, but about preserving a feeling-a moment of awe and connection. I remember pointing out the tiny lighthouse to my children, feeling the crisp air, and vowing to create more memories like this. As a mother, these experiences influence my work profoundly, pushing me to capture authentic, emotional moments that tell a story. The fleeting beauty of family life, the love and warmth of shared moments-these are what inspire me every day. That's the essence of my photography: turning those moments into art.

How do you think winning this competition will impact your career as a photographer?

Winning this competition has been an incredible turning point for my career as a photographer. These awards gave me the confidence and validation to pursue an exciting addition within my business-'Simply Travel.' Through this initiative, I aim to not only capture the beauty of family travel and adventure but also to inspire others to explore the world with their children. I want to empower families to make these memories, to experience the awe of standing in nature, and to bond over shared journeys, just as I have with my own family.

These awards have provided the perfect launching pad for 'Simply Travel,' a space where I can share ideas, tips, and stories from our own adventures in hopes of encouraging others to plan meaningful trips with their loved ones. My goal is to show that travel with children isn't just possible—it's magical. It deepens the family connection and creates lasting memories that transcend time. This recognition from the NAPCP competition has solidified my passion and motivated me to move forward with this expanded offering in my business.

Can you tell us about the winning photograph and what inspired it?



Can you tell us about the winning photograph and what inspired it?

I took this image during our family vacation in Portugal. We were walking through through Lisbon's old town and I saw this giant mural that looked really cool. I try not to 'pose' my kids too much when we travel so I asked if either one of them would want to walk close to the mural and one of my kids obliged. In general, I like to incorporate shadows and reflections in my work because I feel they add interest to images. In this image I loved being able to see my daughter and her shadow against the mural so I created this image.

How do you view the role of print photography in a world that's increasingly digital?

We live in a digital world but I think the impact printed images have does not even come close to that of digital images. There is something about seeing images in a physical form - be it in an album, or as a large framed print - that makes it so much more powerful. I tell this to my clients and I follow this advice myself - don't let your photos gather digital dust on your laptop or on a cloud - PRINT YOUR PHOTOS!

How does it feel to be recognized in this competition?

Photography can be a lonely job as an entrepreneur. You don't have a boss giving you quarterly feedback or any type of incentive/bonus program. Entering contests and placing in them is the recognition that I crave every once in a while, like a little pat on the back and reassurance that I am doing a good job!

Were there any challenges you faced while creating the winning piece? How did you overcome them?

Working with three young boys, especially when they are your own kids, is a challenge in and of itself. I see all these photographers with kiddos who pose for more styled shoots and I cannot fathom that ever happening in my house. Getting a photograph of my kids is always more of a documentary endeavor so it's always about being in the right place at the right time. For this image, we were at a local state park flying styrofoam planes. I told them we were going to have a competition to see who could fly their plane the furthest. This ensured that they all lined up next to each other and were ready for fly when I said 3...2....1...GO!
